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Introduction

The goal of this seminar is to review the impact of attachment theory on psychotherapy processes and outcomes. The first part of the seminar will be a review of attachment theory with a focus on Adult Attachment Interview concepts such as attachment categories, coherence of mind, disorganized mental states, and reflective functioning. Audio excerpts from AAIs will be used to illustrate attachment constructs. Research on the AAI will be reviewed, especially related to psychopathology. In the second part of the seminar I will focus on some of my research on attachment and group psychotherapy that illustrates how attachment functioning can affect psychotherapy outcomes and processes. Finally, I will review clinical implications of attachment constructs and research, and how clinicians can use attachment constructs to inform their practice so that patient outcomes can be improved.
